CURRENT PROJECTS

ASCD Networks. A Networks Advisory Committee is now accepting applications for member-initiated networks whose goals are congruent with those of ASCDs. Application materials are available from ASCD. Project Facilitator: Diane Berreth, ASCD Associate Director for Affiliate Units.

Commission on Instructional Supervision. This group of 75 instructional supervisors is involved in a two-year project to examine major issues in the area of supervision. The Commission met at the annual conference and has been meeting quarterly. Members are working on a National Curriculum Study Institute on supervision, a network catalog of supervision practices, programs and policies, a proposal for a handbook on supervision, and identifying competencies for supervisors. Curriculum Trends Surveys. ASCD has undertaken a series of longitudinal studies of elementary, middle, and secondary school curriculum trends, which will be repeated in three-year cycles. The study of elementary curriculum trends began in 1982; a report will be released this fall. A study of middle school curriculum trends will begin this fall, and a study of high school curriculum is being designed with data collection set for 1985. Elementary School Network. Twice a year 25 elementary schools from across the nation meet to plan for ensuring a balanced curriculum for all elementary schools and to design a process that ensures continual focus on the improvement of teaching and emphasizes the teacher's role in curriculum decision making. High Schools for the Future. Twenty-two high schools are participating in a two-year High Schools Future Planning Network. The primary goal is to strengthen the strategic, long-range planning capabilities of network schools. Other areas of analysis include core curriculum, improved teaching strategies, and use of technology in schools. Schools will communicate through computer networking. Project Facilitator: Gordon Cawelti, ASCD Executive Director.

Policy Analysis. ASCD has recently published *Incentives for Excellence in America's Schools*, a report of the ASCD Policy Task Force on Merit Pay and Career Ladders. A new task force will be meeting to analyze the consequences of increased secondary academic requirements. Project

Supervision/Leader Behavior Training Design. The development of more effective educational leaders is the focus of this project, which builds on current research in organizational development and leader behavior training. The proposed plan calls for a delivery system that employs interactive electronic media. Project Chair: Dale Mann, Teachers College, Columbia University, New York, New York. Project Facilitator: Lewis Rhodes, ASCD Assistant Director for Technology.

Teaching Thinking Project. ASCD is working to improve the quality of student thinking in four ways: (1) Arthur Costa is editing a resource book to be published early this fall; (2) Carolyn Hughes chairs a committee to work with other professional organizations; (3) Jim Belanca is helping plan a four-part video-based inservice program to be available this fall; and (4) John Barell has organized a national network on teaching thinking.
